DIRECTOR MESSAGE

Dear Friend,

Thank you for your support of the Mercy Brown Bag Program in 2022! As we celebrate 40 years of service to the East Bay Community, we would like to express our deep gratitude to all those, past and present, who enable us to serve.

As you know, at Brown Bag, we are passionate about delivering nutritious groceries to low-income, older adults in Alameda County. Those numbers of food-insecure seniors, unfortunately, continue to grow, resulting in yet more important milestones in 2022.

These results came with YOUR help and our "mighty team of eight," delivering not just groceries but social connection, dignity and care with each bag we packed. Our efforts are hugely magnified by our valued partners, notably the Alameda County Community Food Bank and the hundreds of volunteers sorting produce, packing bags, and distributing food with us across the county.

We opened the new CommonSpirit Grocery in 2022, serving seniors in the Fruitvale district of Oakland and beyond, welcoming three seniors on day one and cresting 1,200 a month before Fall was in full swing. There, seniors can build their custom bags with favorites like eggs, walnuts, shelf-stable dairy, and fresh fruits and vegetables of the season. We also commissioned and blessed a new mobile farmer's market, which took to the road in August.

We are honored to do this work. In collaboration with you, and we look to the future with hope, enthusiasm and optimism.

2022 HIGHLIGHTS

- A return to our previous distribution models, from 100% at-home deliveries to support our recipients during COVID, back to delivering across the county at 60+ senior centers and partner agencies.
- We provided 144,000 bags containing more than 2 million pounds of food, enabling 1.8 million meals from the food we delivered.
- Over 8,000 people were fed regularly (2X a month), up 40% from pre-COVID numbers.

2022 AT A GLANCE

SENIOR NUTRITION INSECURITY CONTINUES TO GROW

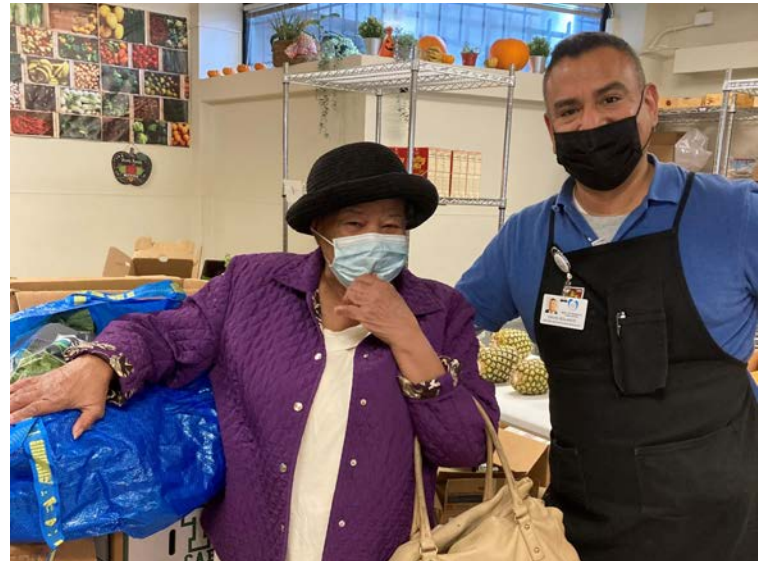
The surge in new recipients since the pandemic's beginning has continued unabated. Our service population has grown by 40% from pre-pandemic numbers, and we expect this trend to continue as the number of food-insecure older adults in Alameda County grows.

97% SATISFACTION RATE

97% of surveyed Brown Bag recipients report having greater access to nutritious foods since receiving the service.

MERCY BROWN BAG INCREASES CHOICE

In 2022, we continued our efforts to offer recipients more choices in the food they receive. Not only is this better for their mental health and program satisfaction, but it is also an essential strategy for reducing waste. We also strive to address cultural food preferences across our recipient populations.



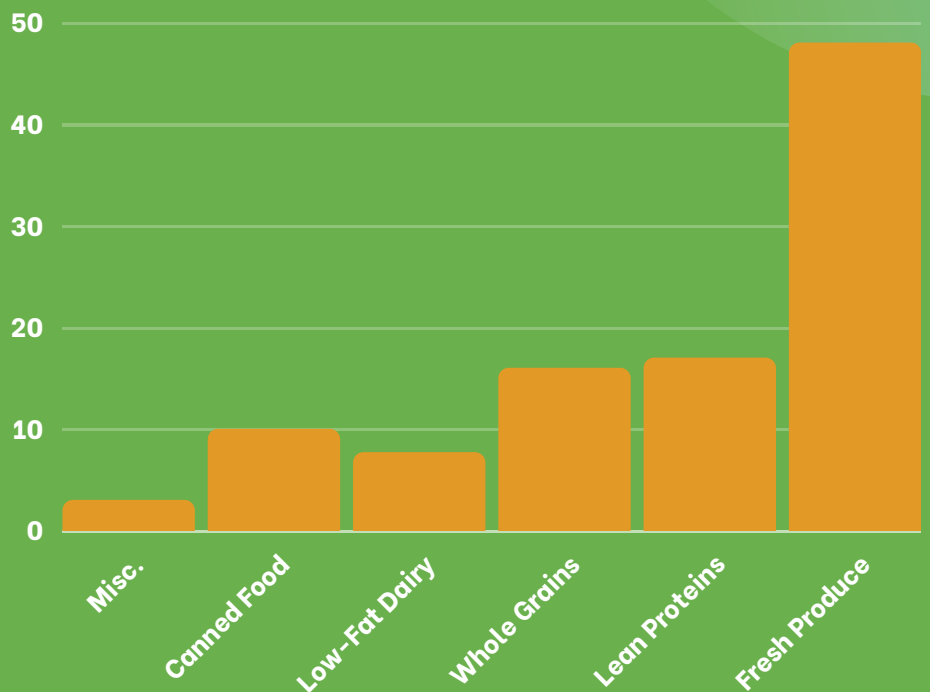
OUR FOCUS: HEALTHY DIETS FOR NUTRITION-INSECURE OLDER ADULTS

Subscribing to the belief that "food is medicine" almost half of all bags (48%) were fresh produce. And following the USDA Good Food Guidelines, 90% of the groceries we distributed were fresh fruit and vegetables, lean protein, low-fat dairy and whole grains.

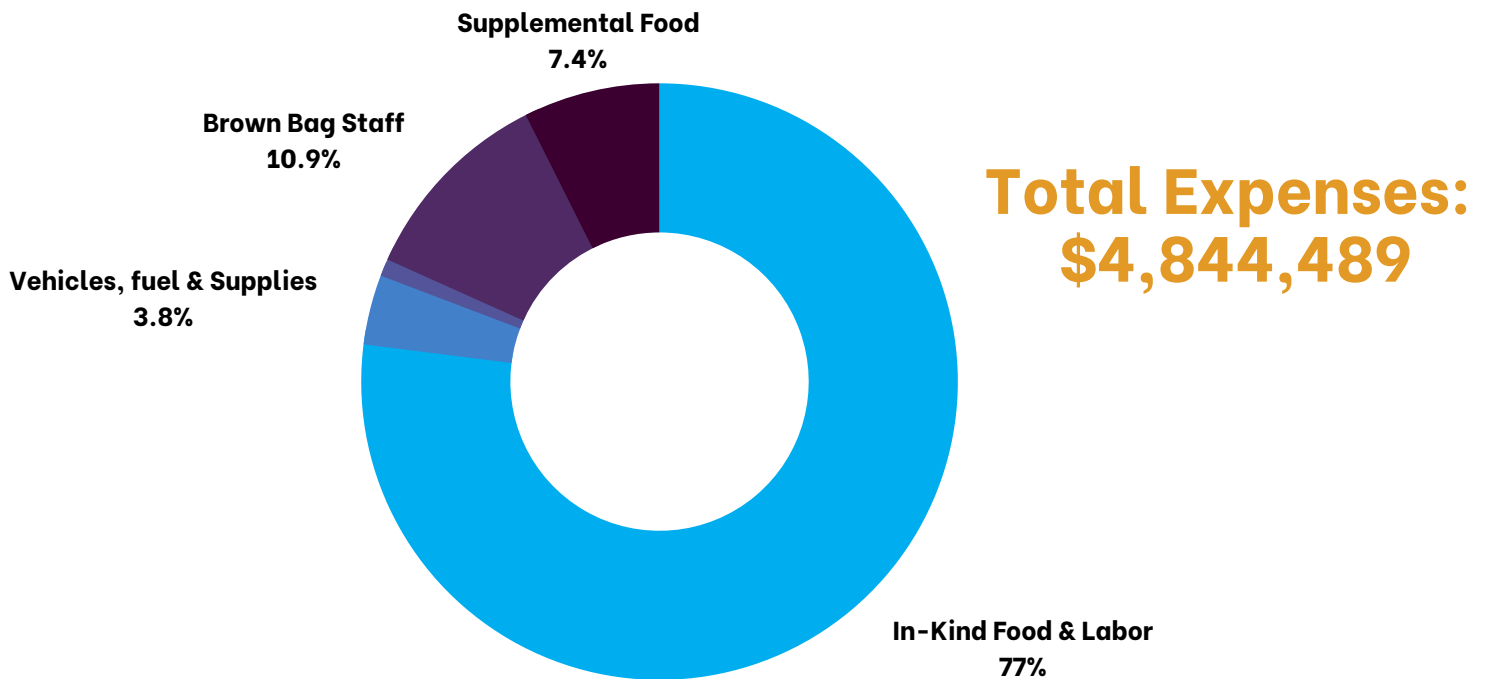

EXPENDITURES FOR 2022



To meet the expanding needs of Alameda County's elder population, 2022 was the most costly year in Brown Bag history. USDA research reports that food-at-home prices increased by 11.4% from January to December of 2022, and the growth of recipients continued to accelerate, not giving us the post-pandemic drop many expected.

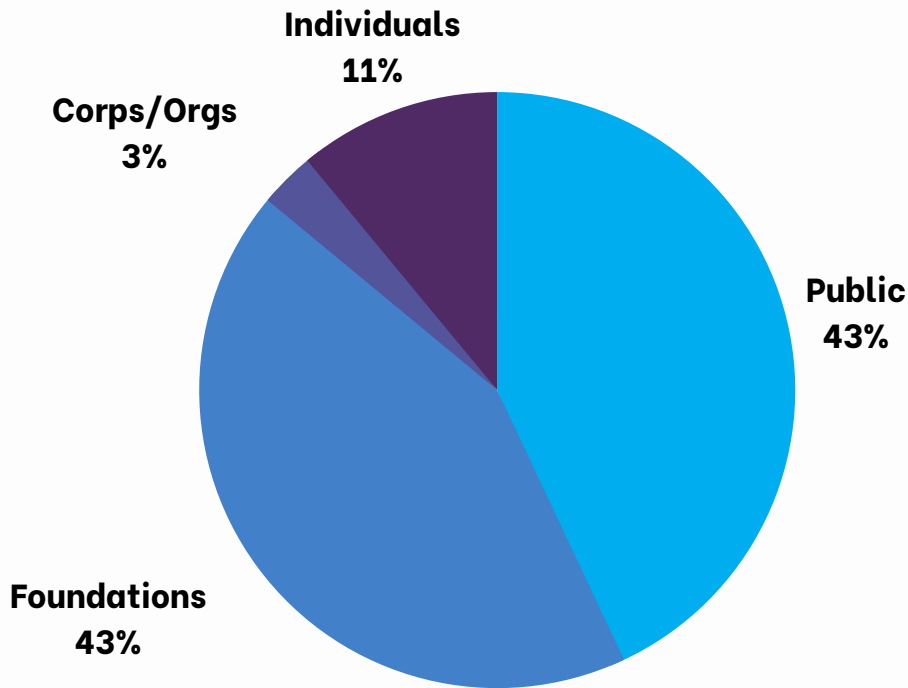
We have continued to find creative ways to fill these fundamental needs, and - as we reverted to our previous business models, we added a second warehouse, an on-site grocery, a new farmers market grocery truck, another community coordinator/driver and volunteer management assistance.

The Brown Bag staff of eight is multiplied in strength and impact hugely by in-kind food donations and volunteer hours. Without the in-kind donations, we could not serve the breadth and magnitude of our current services.

FEEDING OUR FRUITVALE NEIGHBORS

The new CommonSpirit Health Grocery Store has been a huge hit! Since April of 2022, attendance has grown from three people on day one, to 150 the following month, to more than 1,500 in December. This new store has been an incredible boost to serving older adults in the Fruitvale area.

The grocery enables seniors living nearby to shop for food twice a month at no charge, selecting a custom bag that meets their particular needs.

the US Senate's Special Committee on Aging issued a report in November that states food insecurity among older adults has increased by nearly 30 percent since 2001, and disproportionately affects older adults who are racial and ethnic minorities. The Fruitvale neighborhood demographic consists of primarily minorities, 68% Hispanic, 15% Asian, and 9% African American.
